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Episcopal Diocese of South Carolina (before 2012)

The Episcopal Diocese of South Carolina was established in 1785 as one of the nine original dioceses of the Episcopal Church in the United States. In 2012, the diocese split into two rival dioceses, the Diocese of South Carolina and the Episcopal Church in South Carolina, each claiming to be the legitimate successor of the original diocese.

Old St. Andrew's Parish Church

Old St. Andrew's Parish Church in Charleston is the oldest church structure south of Virginia that still hosts regular weekly services. The church was one of 10 Anglican churches established in South Carolina by the Church Act of 1706, which named the Church of England as the official church of the state.

St. Thomas and St. Denis Parish

St. Thomas Episcopal Church, constructed in 1708 near modern Cainhoy, was made the parish church. Early parishes in South Carolina

Parishes of the Anglican Church. Throughout the colonial period, the small population and its limited legal needs kept most government, records keeping, and judicial activity confined to the municipal limits of Charleston. Parishes of the established Anglican Church served as election districts, and courts with jurisdiction over the entire colony sat in Charleston.
